World Gathering of the Clan MacNeil 2014 on the island of Barra, Scotland

Island of Gigha –an ancient territory of the McNeills

The local community-owned Isle of Gigha, the most southerly and one of the most beautiful of the Hebridean Islands. Seven miles long by a mile and a half wide, Gigha is situated three miles west of the Kintyre peninsular, less than a three hour drive from the City of Glasgow. The final part of the drive from Glasgow is a 20 minute ride from Tayinloan on the Kintyre Peninsula on the ferry across to Gigha.

Gigha is breathtaking - sandy beaches, clear green seas and a host of wildlife. There are also the Achamore Gardens to explore.

To help you explore Gigha, there are 12 designated off-road walks. These are described in detail (with maps) in the "Walk Gigha" booklet available from Gigha Stores and Gigha Hotel. Many of the walks start and end at the centre of the island, not far from where the ferry comes in, and are therefore ideal for foot passengers who enjoy walking. The walks vary in length, from half a mile to three miles, and several can be linked to give a whole day's walking. They cover a range of terrain, from mixed woodland, pasture land, sandy beaches, rocky shores, bracken and bramble-covered hillsides to rocky heather-clad hilltops.

On a clear day you can see the coast of Antrim in Ireland to the south west, the long mountainous shapes of Islay and Jura to the north - west, Ben More on Mull far to the north, the hills of Kilberry to the north east, and Goatfell on Arran rising behind the hills of Kintyre to the east.

“Queen’s baton relay

From 14 June to 23 July the Queen’s Baton Relay will travel the length and breadth of Scotland, inviting everyone to be a part of the excitement, celebrations and countdown to the Games. There are countless sports and cultural events taking place daily along the route, including an evening celebration, so that even bigger crowds can enjoy and take part in the festivities.

With up to 4,000 baton bearers joining the relay in more than 400 communities, this is Scotland’s biggest ever relay.

The relay has extended to include the Outer Hebridean islands of Scotland.

The Queen’s Baton landed on the Tràigh Mhòr airport on Monday 7th July around 3.30pm, on its latest leg which included the Western Isles. It had travelled more than 200 miles from Stirling to Barra.

Safeguarding the baton was young actress Cherry Campbell, who plays Katie Morag in the BBC series based on the popular children’s books. Cherry was piped off the beach by Claire Frances

MacNeil, one of the Feis Bharraigh pipers, and was welcomed by a good crowd of people. Cherry and Clyde, the Commonwealth Mascot, then spent some time posing for photos before the baton heading on its journey to Castlebay.

On Tuesday morning the baton left on the first ferry over to Eriskay and the relay then visited Daliburgh, Liniclate, Benbecula Airport, St. Kilda, Tarbert, the Butt of Lewis Lighthouse and finished in Stornoway.”

Barra Airport has picked up a 3rd place award in the Private Fly’s 2014 poll for the most stunning airport approaches in the world. The shortlist was selected by an expert judging panel and the finalists were judged by the voting public. Private Fly’s website highlighted -

“World’s largest Haggis

WHAT is claimed to be world’s largest haggis, weighing in at about a ton (1010kg), has been unveiled at the Royal Highland Show.

Hundreds of pounds of pork offal, oatmeal and onions went into the colossal creation which measured more than a metre wide and high and

had to be transported to the Ingliston showground near Edinburgh on a truck.

Wayne Godfrey, chief executive of Browns Food Group, which owns Hall's, said: "2014 is the official year of the haggis and so we thought this was the perfect occasion to reclaim the Guinness World Record title that was first held by Hall's over 30 years ago.

"We knew we were aiming for a very ambitious size and weight and so everyone at Hall's is thrilled we pulled it off, reclaiming the title - and beating the previous record by such a significant amount."

Hall's said the 2,227 lb. (1,010 kg.) haggis' claim to be the world's largest has been officially verified by Guinness World Records. The previous record stood at 1,234lb (560 kg.).

Scottish food and environment secretary Richard Lochhead said: "Haggis is Scotland's iconic national dish and is enjoyed by people from all over the world.

It is the perfect way to celebrate one of our nation's proudest culinary traditions whilst raising money for a good cause."

We were honoured at our last national clan gathering in Caboolture to have Bill Hart, retired piping master of Knox Grammar School play an assortment of pipes to us during our dinner and to talk to us about the pipers and music which has related to the Clan MacNeil.

Bill has been recognised by the Celtic Council of Australia for his valuable contribution to teaching of highland piping with an award, Duine Urrmach.

He presented to us a folder of information about pipers such as Archie MacNeill born in Govan, Glasgow, Seumas MacNeill who was born on the isle of Gigha and became the founder of the College of Piping in Glasgow with Thomas Pearson and Andrew MacNeill of Colonsay.

Another famous piper was Lachlan McNeill Campbell who descended from the McNeills of Gigha. His father was Hector McNeill who was born at Tarbert, isle of Gigha about 1764 and married Margaret Campbell of Kintarbert of Duntroon in 1794.

Margaret was the daughter of Dugald Campbell of Kintarbert and Isabella Campbell of Melfort. They produced the following children –
Lachlan McNeill born 1795
Dugald McNeill born 1797
Isabella McNeill born 1799

The three children changed their surname on the death of their mother to McNeill Campbell when they inherited the Kintarbert estate.

Lachlan was a recognised piper and there are two piping tunes in his memory, "Salute to Lachlan McNeil Campbell of Kentarbert" and "Lachlan McNeill Campbell of Kentarbert's fancy".
